The end of another academic year is swiftly approaching and it is a good time to reflect and celebrate. This term has been quite eventful. The Y5 and Y6 pupils enjoyed a "jam packed" outdoor three-day residential experience at Delaware, Gunnislake - canoeing, walking on moors, dry-slope skiing, archery, abseiling, exploring our senses at Cotehele and problem solving activities. Everyone learnt many new skills, including the social aspects of living together and developing their own independence looking after their own belongings, helping with domestic chores and responding to new challenges. School residentials are often read about when an accident of some sort has occurred and it is a huge responsibility for the teaching staff. but having completed a successful residential, the feedback from the children and parents make it all worthwhile.

The Teddy Bears Picnic proved to be a great success. The gorgeous weather certainly helped. A big thank you to all the grown-ups who came along and helped.

Wherever you travel throughout the length and breadth of England, the landscape is always dominated by church towers. In our part of Cornwall in particular, the churches and their church towers are often hundreds of years old. They are a reminder of the life that is centred around these places which has been the Spiritual life of the community for hundreds of years and has been the centre where the main Rites of Passage, (birth, marriage and death) have been celebrated.

Obviously the cost of maintaining these wonderful buildings goes up month by month. In the three churches of our Benefice, we have a "Gift Aid" scheme, which means that anyone who gives to the upkeep of the church and its life, and is a taxpayer, can allow tax to be claimed back at no extra cost to themselves. It is a very simple thing to do and would benefit the churches exceedingly. John Edward-Collins is our Gift Aid secretary at Michaelstow and Joanne Hyde is our Gift Aid secretary at St Mabyn. I am delighted that Derek Harper allowed me to persuade him to take on the task for St Tudy, so if he appears on your doorstep listen to him with love and kindness.

We are hoping that from this Autumn we will have closer links with our Methodist friends and perhaps meet together for Evening Worship four times each year on the fifth Sunday.

A few weeks ago the Archivist from Truro visited our Benefice and he happened to point out that the arch near the organ in St Tudy Church had originally been built as the entrance to a Lady Chapel. I mentioned this to some members of the congregation who remembered when it was a Lady Chapel not so very long ago. As a result we have decided to return it to what it was. We have already cleaned it out and got rid of the rubbish. During the next few months we should like to restore it, into a place of peace for private prayer and meditation and where the smaller weekly services can be held. We have been visited by the DAC from Truro and we have some idea of what faculties will be needed. We hope that it will be a Lady Chapel of Remembrance as some of you may wish to donate something in memory of a loved one who has died, but whose life was centred in St Tudy. By the beginning of August there will be a list in church of what will be needed starting from a box of Communion wafers to kneelers and velvet curtains.
