Here is the recipe they requested! 8ozs chopped dates, 1 cup of boiling water, 1 teaspoon bi-carb – soak for 1/2 an hour. Cream 2ozs butter and 1 cup caster sugar; add 1 1/2 cups plain flour and 1 egg. Mix in well with date mixture. Bake for 35 mins at 180 degrees until firm in the middle. 6 tablespoons brown sugar, 2/2 tablespoons of butter and 3 tablespoons of single cream. Boil together and pour over the pudding.
