ST MABYN PARISH COUNCIL ELECTIONS – CASUAL VACANCIES

During the past year, parishioners will be aware that elections were held in St Mabyrn due to vacancies occurring on the Parish Council for various reasons. To avoid any misunderstanding, the following procedures have to be followed.

When a casual vacancy occurs, there are two methods of filling it. Firstly, the vacancy can be filled by a parishioner being co-opted onto the Parish Council by Parish Councillors voting for they think is suitable.

Secondly, 10 or more parishioners, not 1 or 2, but at least 10 can call for an election. This overrides the Parish Councillors co-opting method.

If there is only one parishioner nominated for the election, that person is elected unopposed and there is no election. This happened last year on one occasion. If there are 2 or more parishioners nominated for the vacancy, a date for the election is fixed by the NCDC Electoral Officer, who receives the nominations. At anytime up to the date of the election, any parishioner, including Parish Councillors and family relatives can canvass for any person nominated. This is perfectly legal and democratic, which happens and is common practice at General and By-elections by our MPs and supporters for their candidates of all political parties. It may be suggested that an election, where the parishioners have the right to choose who they wish to fill the vacancy and represent them on the Parish Council, is more democratic and representative, than being co-opted by a few people.

Any further information required, please speak to your Parish Councillors, who should be aware of such procedures. There are 10 councillors on the Parish Council. In May, all 10 will stand down after the 4 year period and parishioners will have the right again to choose who they wish to have represent them, provided there are more than 10 nominations to require an election.

WHERE WILL BE THE NEXT REDUNDANT CHURCH?

The dictionary tells us that the word "redundant" means superfluous!! The January edition of the National Trust Magazine contains an article that should have relevance for all of us. Its heading is "The trickle of churches becoming redundant is predicted to become a torrent". Why should this be so? There are many reasons some of which are all too apparent to those of us who live in this Benefice of St Tudy, St Mabyn and

Michaelstow. Research has shown that although up and down the country congregations manage to raise £67 million each year, the sum required for repair and maintenance is nearer £185 million. Furthermore 45 per cent of all Grade 1 listed buildings are churches. The records show that since 1969 more than 10 per cent of Church of England churches have been made redundant, partly at least because in the last 15 years the Church of England has lost almost 2 million active worshippers.

The reality is, as we all know, that the care of the churches and the burden of maintaining them falls on a relatively small number of people and the increasing age of existing congregations suggests that in another 10 years time there may be only a few (or even none) able to sustain the financial and physical task of keeping our churches open and alive. And that is when "redundancy" becomes the relevant word.

The question that concerns us all, here and elsewhere, is what is to be done about this increasingly worrying problem? Saving our churches is a task beyond the means of any one group or organisation. One obvious answer is to increase the size of congregations to raise the potential for increasing income. But how do we do that? And is this sufficient to save the heritage of centuries past as expressed in our churches? The reality as the Magazine says is that "our churches and chapels need new money and new people and lots of both".
