## CAMEL VALLEY AND BODMIN MOOR PROTECTION SOCIETY

Since 1968 when it was known as The Camel Valley Protection Society and in 1986 when it amalgamated with The Bodmin Countryside Group, the Camel Valley and Bodmin Moor Protection Society (a registered charity since 1987) has aimed to improve, protect and preserve the towns, villages and countryside within the Society's area of interest.

The Society, with the active help of its members, monitors and makes representations about planning policies and applications that could be detrimental to the area. It works closely with planning authorities and other associations whose interests overlap; recognising that some change will be inevitable but that it is carried out in sympathy with the magnificent landscape of the area. Care is taken to restrict the Society's intervention to matters of importance and to back its comments with relevant planning arguments.

The Society holds about three meetings a year at local venues, when speakers are invited to cover subjects of relevance and interest. The next meeting will be at Jamaica Inn on Wednesday 12th February at 7.30pm at which Colin Hawke (Chairman of the Cornwall Hedge Group) will be giving an illustrated talk on Trees and Woodlands in Cornwall, with special emphasis on North Cornwall and Bodmin Moor.
