The Parish Council met on Wednesday 26th May for their Annual General Meeting. Councillors elected were Mr Brian Lamerton Chairman, Mr Nick Fletcher Vice-Chairman, Mrs Margaret Ham, Mrs Mavis Kingdon, Mr Jim Kempthorne, Mr Lee Maddon, Mr Jonathon March, Mr Chris Selby, Mrs Margaret Shelley and Mr Mev Shelley.

The regular Parish Council meeting followed the Annual meeting in which there were no planning applications to discuss. The Parish Council accounts for last year ending 31 March 2004 had been reviewed by accountant, Mr Brian Wright and were received and accepted by the Council.

It is noted that the Parish Council physical assets are the public toilets, bus shelters, the set of hand bells and land in the village centre with a total value of £21,000 for insurance purposes. The St Tudy PC risk management scheme was adopted and a copy will be given to all Councillors at the next meeting.

The tree conservation officer will be asked to supervise the tidying of the Ilex tree in the centre of the village by the bus shelter. It was hoped that a skateboard park in part of the playing field can be built dependent on the football club plans.

MEMORIES OF ST MABYN SCHOOL 1941-43

The following article was sent in for publication by the late Mrs Jean Batten before her recent death.

My memories of St Mabyn School begin, in September 1941, when I was appointed as teacher of the junior class. At that time, children from 5 years of age to 14 attended and they were divided into three classes.

The headmaster was Mr Clifford Trevorrow, who used the larger downstairs room while the juniors used the upstairs room and the infants the small room downstairs. In each classroom the heating was by a "slow-but-sure" combustion coke burning stove with an iron fireguard around - very useful for drying damp coats of the children who had a long walk to school. I remember families who used the parish footpaths from Polglaze and Trescowe, whilst two girls came by pony from Heligan and stabled their steed at their grandparents in the village.

The caretaker, Mrs Watts, would light fires in the three stoves each morning, so quite often we were greeted with a smoky atmosphere and it wasn't much warmer inside than out until about 11 o'clock. For the rest of the day, it was the teacher's responsibility to keep the fire topped up making sure it was low by 4 o'clock, so that the ashes could be cleared out when Mrs Watts arrived soon after the children left.

Mr Trevorrow was a strict disciplinarian and the timetable formal with daily reciting of tables and spelling tests, the result of which has stood many in good stead over the years. Twice a week the boys enjoyed practical gardening whilst the girls had instruction in needlework beginning by making mats, using canvas-type material with varying types of stitches for mum's dressing table progressing to peg bags and slipper bags, finally to garment making. I well remember one girl taking home, with pride, a blue flannelette nightdress she had made.

"Make do and mend" was a by-word in the war years and girls brought dresses of their mothers or maybe a best shirt of dad's with some wear left in it, to start a new life when recycled into a blouse or bolero for themselves or maybe a baby's dress for a new arrival in the family.

Games lessons consisted of football for the boys and rounders or square ball for the girls. In summer folk dancing to music from the gramophone and maypole dancing to the strains of Tommy Kelly's fiddle were popular at village events and the church fete.

The galvanized building by the hall served as the canteen for school meals. The cook, Miss Hobbah, produced super dinners using a huge black coal burning stove. Her job must have been a very busy one especially when the fire was temperamental and had to be encouraged with the help of a few sticks in order to raise the oven temperature to baking heat.

Evacuees from the London area with their teachers, Miss Howard and Miss Daniel, were welcomed into the homes of the villagers. Many have kept in touch to the present day and come for holiday visits. Some of them had never seen wild flowers growing in the fields and I remember the joy on their faces as they ran through the field with the grasses and flowers slipping through their fingers. At that time, the hall was taken over for a classroom and I moved there with a mixed group of evacuees and local children.

Christmas was a very special time when each class contributed to a concert with a play or some songs and carols. Every child was involved and parents came to the event full of excitement at the thought of their child performing on the stage.

Soon more evacuees were to join us from Plymouth with their teacher Miss Williams. So now the school was bursting at the seams, but Mr Trevorrow took it all in his stride and we were organized into working efficiently, together with his wife, who was also a great support in school events and also within the village.

Days always began with hymns and prayers uniting us all as a big family and before we left for home, we offered a prayer for God's care and protection until we met again next morning.

1941 and 1942 were years which have given me many happy memories of St Mabyn School, the children, the parents and staff who helped to make those years so enjoyable.
