A REMINDER OF BELSEN

At the service at St Tudy on 8th May, commemorating the anniversary of V.E. Day, Meg Read mentioned a woman who had been the first Nursing Sister to enter the Belsen concentration camp, when it was found by the British Army. This reminded me of the most horrible film I ever saw, which has stayed in my mind for 60 years. It was made as the camp was liberated in 1945. People (men or women, I was not sure) walking aimlessly about inside the wire. I don't remember their clothing, but it must have been little better than rags. Their wasted figures, in particular their arms and legs like thin sticks, and their obvious bewilderment, is with me still. No "horror movie" has replaced that glimpse in my mind. They had reached a state of mind in which the idea of "freedom" had no real meaning, many of them died, I heard later, even when ample food, clothing etc were given to them. At Belsen, as I understand it, people were not gassed, just starved to death.

Why had this abomination come about? Was the Camp Commandant a sadist, or did he feed his staff well by starving the prisoners in his care? Did the German Government deliberately send insufficient food? Did the German public have any idea what was being done in their name? I don't doubt that almost all the ordinary people of Germany at that time, Hitler or no Hitler, would have been horrified by the glimpse I had of Belsen in 1945.

Why did it happen? Surely, because, at some critical moment, someone did NOT say "What is happening at Belsen (or Auschwitz, etc)?" "Why is it happening?" "It must be stopped". Where did the slippery slope to Belsen start? Is there a slippery slope awaiting our feet in Britain now in 2005? One labelled "asylum-seekers" perhaps? Or (radio a few days ago) labelled "young black boys who disappear from schools in London (and perhaps elsewhere)"?

MICHAELSTOW PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

1. Plans. The Council supported the claims of a parishioner with regard to a Certificate of Lawfulness for the continued use of land as a reclamation stone yard and storage of lorry used in the business.

A planning application for the erection of an extension to a recently approved temperature controlled potato storage shed had been approved by NCDC.

A previous planning application for the erection of a cottage style dwelling and garage in Treveighan has been withdrawn.

2. Village Green. A contractor has been appointed to maintain the village green throughout the 2005 growing season.
3. Footpaths. The Council did not undertake any work on its footpath network during 2004/05 for which a claim could be submitted under the terms of the Local Maintenance Project. The new LMP agreement for 2005/06 was received.
4. Noticeboards. There was no response to the advertisements in this Magazine for parishioners to put themselves forward to form a development group for the purpose of applying for a grant to fund replacement noticeboards. This funding will now be applied for via an alternative means.
5. Trafalgar Weekend Celebrations. Fundraising will be organised to purchase fireworks for this occasion (21-23 October). It is hoped that volunteers from the parish will be willing to help with the lighting of a beacon.
6. Parish Council Accounts 2004/05. These have been audited and subsequently approved by the Council.
7. Resignation. Mrs Linda Sleeman tendered her resignation as a Parish Councillor. Action is in hand to advertise this casual vacancy.
8. There is to be a service in Truro Cathedral on 11th September (theme "Thanks for our Future") to commemorate the 60th anniversary of the end of the war in Europe (VE/VJ). Whilst there will be military bands and parades of service and ex-service personnel, the Cornwall Association of Local Councils would like to involve former members of the Women's Land Army, those who had served in any of the Civil Defence Services and anyone who had been an evacuee.
