CANDLEMAS AT ST MABYRN

On the evening of 2nd February, Candlemas, St Mabyrn Church was transformed into the Temple at Jerusalem. It was 40 days after Jesus' birth and Mary had observed the rites of purification required by the Jewish law after the birth of a child. Jesus was to be presented in the temple to be "redeemed". Mary and Joseph brought Jesus to the Temple. In the Court of Gentiles they bought a pair of doves and then processed up the aisle towards the Court of the Women. As they passed, candles were lit to symbolise the "Light of Christ". Anna, an elderly prophetess greeted the family and praised and worshipped God for the coming of Christ. Mary, being a woman, could go no further into the temple, so Joseph took Jesus to the altar, where he handed the baby to the priest. While the incense was burning on the altar, Joseph gave the priest the doves to be sacrificed and Jesus was handed back to Joseph. Simeon, who had waited all his life for this moment, greeted Jesus with words, which we now know as the Nunc Dimittis. Candles across the chancel steps, the Court of Israel, were lit when Jesus, the "Light of the World" passed and candles at the entry to the sanctuary were lit as the priest removed the altar rail and Jesus was placed on the altar. All the candles in the sanctuary shone out, symbolising Christ opening the temple, the pathway to God, to all people; even women! From the west end of the church, the candles were seen in the form of the Orthodox Cross, the cross with two crossbars. The lower crossbar has slipped and is not horizontal indicating the tradition that Jesus bore even more pain because his feet were not supported. Throughout the service, between the singing of hymns, Margaret explained the symbolism of all we were doing and seeing. A moving, informative and enjoyable evening's worship. Thank you Margaret.

NORTH CORNWALL DISTRICT COUNCIL NEWS

Council tax increase. Councillors have agreed to set a 7.8% increase in the NCDC element of council tax for the forthcoming year. This amounts to an extra £9 a year for the average household. NCDC uses around 12% of the total council tax bill for local services like: refuse and litter collection, beach cleaning, recycling, environmental health, planning, economic development, electoral services, benefits and leisure centres. Most of the money you pay in council tax pays for countrywide services like education, social services, highways, the fire service, trading standards and the police. This year the central government grant for North Cornwall was the worst in the county, so although our own costs have risen by 3%, we are having to increase the council tax by a higher amount to make up the shortfall and

maintain services. In the coming year, we will be looking to make savings of up to £200,000 to keep council tax increases at a reasonable level in 2004/05.

ST TUDY GARDEN PRODUCE ASSOCIATION

The year started with a real treat. In January Tracey Wilson from the Duchy Nursery entertained a packed house with her tales of winning a Gold Medal at The Chelsea Flower Show. Everyone who managed to get there was delighted to see this glamorous plant woman's slides and hear her amusing and clever commentary, especially as she had been double booked by Cardinham Garden Club - and we'd won!

The following month, in February, Colin Hawke gave us a well-illustrated talk on trees. Despite being a horrid wet night, the meeting was very well attended. Colin is the Principal Countryside Advisory Officer for Forestry for Cornwall County Council and had many examples of damage to trees over the years. He finished off with some interesting information on growing apples and retaining "lost" species. Many trials have been undertaken to save these, particularly at Probus Gardens. Incidentally, Probus are desperately in need of any volunteer, not just in the garden but the shop and tearooms; give them a ring if you can spare any time (01726 882597).
