CHURCH DATES FOR YOUR DIARIES

Friday 1st November is All Saints Day. This is one of the great festivals of the Christian Church, so there will be a service of Holy Communion at St Mabyn at 7pm. Please come along. It will be an opportunity for all those who cannot get to the Sunday services to Worship God in Church.

Saturday 2nd November is All Souls Day. It is an opportunity for you to remember all those whom you have loved but see no longer. It will be a quiet and gentle service and you will have the opportunity to light a candle in their memory. It will last between 20-30 minutes. From 20th October, lists will be placed at the back of all three churches for you to write down the names of your loved ones, so that they can be read out at the service, for after all, along with each one of us, they are all part of "The Communion of Saints".

Sunday 10th November is Remembrance Sunday. The services will be as in previous years, 9.30am at Michaelstow with Rev. Alfred Scott, 10.15am at St Mabyn with Preb. Urwin and Mr Peter Cosier and 10.50am at St Tudy with Rev. Margaret Millson.

Saturday 30th November 7pm St Tudy Church. Organ recital given by Dr Geoffrey Gibbons, organist at the Estate Chapel of the Earl of Aylesford, Packington. Warwickshire. There is no admission charge but a silver collection will be taken towards the refurbishment of the Lady Chapel.

Sunday 1st December is Advent Sunday. We are hoping to re-dedicate the refurbished Lady Chapel on this day. Obviously it will depend on many factors. Donations towards the cost of the refurbishment will be gratefully received. It does not matter how small the contribution is. Every penny counts. It would be very helpful if the people who have promised certain items could finalise these arrangements, so that I can get them ordered. Hopefully, there will be a book in the Chapel with photographs and information about those in whose memory donations have been made. It will be a permanent record and have its place in the history of the church. After the service there will be a further opportunity to meet and greet people at a parish Sunday Lunch at the Cornish Arms. Details of this will be put in church.

It was a very thought provoking experience.

During this month of November, let us remember to pray for all those of every tribe and nation who are still suffering from the effects of war and let us pray for peace in our time.

ST MABVN GARDEN CLUB

Our Chairman commenced proceedings by welcoming members to the October meeting and reflected on the outing to the Cider Farm and the fact that everybody who went had a very interesting afternoon. Our speaker for the evening was Mrs Beryl Davies. Beryl is chairperson of the Friends of Probus (Gardens). This is a voluntary organisation, which headed by Beryl and her husband, has for the past four years renovated and reconstructed a six acre garden near Truro known as Probus Gardens. These are open to the public all the year round and also hold many seminars on gardening (during this time; visitors are very welcome as it is the gardens' only form of income apart from plant sales. They are always in need of volunteers as they only have one full time paid head gardener.

Beryl used the winter garden at Probus Gardens as an example of what can be planted. As always, she said that preparation of the soil before planting is most important as well as mulching afterwards. The pellets used in hanging baskets can be sprinkled around; they will retain moisture and avoid watering during dry periods. Beryl brought many examples of plants from the garden and explained the advantages and disadvantages of having them in the garden. The accent was all the year round interest. Some plants flower in summer and have berries in winter and some change the colour of their foliage in winter. All this in addition to the traditional winter/spring flowering bulbs. We had a very interesting evening; Beryl was on top form combining her extensive knowledge of her subject, intermingled with a bit of wit!

On behalf of the club, Mr Hiscock thanked Beryl for a most enjoyable evening and said we would be certain to welcome her back sometime. There was certainly a splash of colour on the table containing the flower heads with a yellow camellia taking pride of place. There were plenty of bargains on the plant stall. The rattle was drawn, we had our cup of tea and a chat and everybody drifted home.
