Safety in Flats and Bedsits. One of the duties of our environmental Health service is to monitor conditions in "houses in multiple occupation" - in other words houses that are split up into bedsits or flats where more than one family or tenant shares the same property. Landlords of such properties have various legal

obligations to their tenants. NDCDC, other Cornish councils and the fire service have published a safety log book for such landlords to help them carry out the necessary safety checks and to be aware of their obligations to their tenants. ST MABYN GARDEN CLUB

There was quite a good gathering at the hall for the first meeting of the season and our chairman commenced proceedings by welcoming members noting that there were quite a few new faces. The chairman also reflected that the outing had been very successful, as was the Garden Safari event, which raised £300 for the Macmillan Nurses. He thanked everybody involved and noted how nice all the gardens were.

Our speaker for the evening was Mr David Topliffe who explained how to make wine. David comes from Chapel Amble and has been making wine for about thirty years. He said that wine could be made from many plants and fruits and even the sap from trees. He suggested that you try and find an old recipe book from a book stall and use this for the basis of wine making, because some of the old recipes are best. David explained that to start with you should have at least two demijohns and a fermentation bucket. You should avoid using any old bucket especially coloured buckets because the colour could come out while fermenting

and taint the wine. He explained that the wine should be kept warm during fermentation and warming pads can be purchased for this use. When finished fermenting, the wine can be bottled or left in a sealed demijohn and stored in a cool dark place (a garage is ideal). Most wines improve in flavour if stored for many years. If you intend to store the wine for quite a few years use a 'cork' cork and if you intend to drink it fairly soon, (as you can with certain wine kits), use a plastic cork. When David had finished, we then went on to sample some of his wine. Our chairman thanked David for coming along and I think we all learnt a lot from his experience in wine making and might have a go ourselves.

There were quite a few flower heads on display with a dahlia taking pride of place. We finished off the evening with a cup of tea and a chat and the raffle was drawn. Our next meeting is on Wednesday 9th October at 7.30 in the village hall, when our speaker will be Mrs Beryl Davies talking on the Winter Garden. Everybody welcome. We still need new members. Please come along Beryl is a very knowledgeable person and always gives a very interesting talk.
